OBITUARY

Charles Shriver -- alias Chuckles the Clown

WITH GREAT regret we report the death of a very good friend of St. Stephen's, Mr. Charles ("Charlie") Mayer Shriver, Jr., for 32 years the husband of founding member Ruth Dischinger Shriver.

One of the parish's fondest traditions was the Annual Fall Picnic and Blessing of the Carrollton Hounds which had been a fixture at the Shriver's Westminster farm for the best part of three decades.

Charlie, who was 81, passed away on Sunday, January 10th at Carroll Hospital Center after a brief illness. He was born in Baltimore on December 14th, 1928, the son of Charles M. Shriver Sr. and Ruth Lee French Shriver. He was a graduate of Gilman School and the University of Maryland School of Agriculture.

A lifelong dairy farmer, Charlie was a member of the Maryland Draft Horse Association and was one of the last Carroll County farmers to actively farm with draft horses.

An enthusiastic agriculturalist, he was a member of the Land O' Lakes Cooperative and strong supporter of American agriculture in general. He was also a member of the alumni associations of both Gilman School and the University of Maryland.
