Fr. James will be leaving St. Stephen's in mid-April to accept a call the rectorship of St. Paul's Anglican Church at Whitehall, Pennsylvania. St. Paul's is a newly formed congregation and one of James' primary tasks will be to preside over the construction of a new parish church.

This presents quite a challenge as anyone who remembers the construction of St. Stephen's own parish church doubtless remembers. Anglicans tend to be folks with strong opinions and keeping them all on the same page is a bit like herding cats. But we are sure James' is more than equal to the task.

James will be greatly missed – and not only for his presence at the altar, his soaring operatic tenor and his infectious laugh. A gifted teacher, his command of Scripture and theology has been a tremendous asset in the pulpit, at Bible studies and other educational venues.

His departure will also be felt in the wider community. James is a great favorite with the residents of Glen Meadow and Edenwald and the people of At Jacob's Well. He is also an active member of the Kiwanis.

Feeling totally cool about global warming

IT IS HARD to believe in global warming when the people of Baltimore are buried up to their necks in a record fall of snow. But then I confess that, as a student of history, I harbor doubts about the notion that our present climatic conditions constitute some sort of norm.

After all, when the Romans arrived in Britain wine grapes were growing in Scotland. And, what's more, when Eric the Red named Greenland he wasn't fibbing: It was warm enough to sustain an agriculturally-based civilization.

All of that changed towards the end of the Middle Ages with the advent of the "Mini-Ice Age", the tail end of which still affects our climate today. The steep drop in temperatures forced British monks to abandon wine-making and obliged Greenland's Nordic settlers to up stakes and set sail for more temperate climes.

The situation is nowhere near as desperate as that here in Baltimore County, but the snow and ice have certainly caused a great deal of trouble. Not least, the weather forced us to cancel Sunday services on February 7th and to suspend for a week publication of the newsletter.

Church attendance has also been heavily down. The churchyard and the surrounding streets have been well plowed, but folks have been understandably chary about venturing out on the highways.
