Parish says farewell to Father James Johnson

THE PARISH said farewell to The Rev. James V. Johnson at a rip-roaring party at the home of Rosa and Jim Halbert on Saturday, April 10th. Fr. James, who has served the parish for almost five years, resigned as St. Stephen's associate rector to answer a call to lead the newly founded St. Paul's Anglican Church in Whitehall, Pennsylvania.

While it was a fun occasion -- a typical St. Stephen's parish party -- it was a time for shedding a few tears. After all, it is never easy to say "adieu" to some one like Fr. James who has won so many hearts with his preaching, his splendid tenor voice and his cheerful nature.

As a mark of their appreciation, the parishioners presented Fr. James with a purse, including a check for \$1,500 from the Parish Life Committee.

Fr. James preached his final sermon to the parish on Sunday, April 11th, Low Sunday. Afterwards, he told parishioners, "You are a wonderful, warm and welcoming parish. You will go with me in my heart wherever I go."

The Rev. Guy P. Hawtin, the Rector, said: "It's always hard to say farewell to a friend and colleague who has won such a warm place in our hearts. But we also should be happy that our friend has been called to lead a parish of his own.

"Our loss is Whitehall's gain. But, remember, 'farewell' is not 'good bye.' Whitehall is not so far away and, as most of you know, Fr. James' mother lives in the neighborhood, which means he will be visiting Baltimore quite regularly. Besides, there are neat little inventions called the telephone and e-mail that will enable us to stay in touch." **AEH**

AN APPRECIATION

The parish bids adieu to a beloved founder

FRANK Edie Curran, Jr. -- a much loved founder of this parish -- passed away peacefully, surrounded by his family, at the Greater Baltimore Medical Center on the Tuesday of Holy Week, March 30th. His funeral took place in a packed St. Stephen's Church on Friday in Easter Week, April 9th.

In life, Frank was a hard guy to miss. He stood 6ft 2ins and weighed 220 pounds -- unchanged from his days as both offensive and defensive tackle on the University of North Carolina's football squad. His prowess on the football field earned him the nickname "Bear."

A lifelong Episcopalian, Frank was a member of the vestries of both Trinity Church, Towson, and All Saints Church at Bayhead, N.J. -- his family's summer home. He also served both parishes as a lay reader. His proudest moment was serving as chaliceist for Archbishop of Canterbury Donald Coggin when he visited Bayhead in the 1970s.

Frank was a churchman who both admired the 1928 Prayer Book and routinely used it at family prayer services. His rejection of the Episcopal Church's 1979 Prayer Book was based not solely on a dislike of the revised language and mix and match liturgy, but a belief that it was far less user friendly for the laity than the 1928 book.

Not being the sort of person who easily accepts the unacceptable, he joined the other members of the Baltimore Chapter of the Prayer Book Society in founding St. Stephen's. What's more, he took a leading role in getting the parish church built -- searching for suitable sites, commissioning architects and spurring less adventurous members of the congregation into action. His deepest regret about the church he played such an important role in building is that it doesn't yet have a steeple with a cross on its peak.

Frank (Edie to his family and oldest friends) was born in 1928 in Greenboro, NC. Awarded a football scholarship to the University of North Carolina, he graduated with a B.S. in

business in 1949 and worked for most of his career as a top sales engineer for Hackney Brothers Body Company, makers of refrigerated truck bodies.

In 1950, he married the former Ardith Marilyn Valentine, who hailed from Bayhead, New Jersey, where the youthful Frank spent most of his summers. Ardith, who survives him, is a former Valentina model and a no less striking figure than Frank. Tall, slim, exquisitely dressed, she sports an eye patch which invariably matches the outfit she is wearing.

A devout, Christian, devoted parent and loyal and generous friend, Frank leaves an enormous gap in the lives of all who knew him. We extend our deepest sympathy to Ardith, the couple's daughter Stacey, their two sons, Dee and Val, and their host of grandchildren. It was truly a joy and privilege to have known him. **GPH**
