Glencoe Gardens closes its doors with a 3-day auction

ONE OF Baltimore County's greatest treasures, the fabled antique shop Glencoe Gardens, is going out of business in style – with a mammoth three-day auction to be held at its 15900 York Road, Sparks, location on Thursday, June 24th, Friday, June 25th, and Saturday, June 26th.

Parishioners Colby and Wiley Hawks decided to close the doors of their store for the last time following the sale of the old barn upon the death of their landlord, Mrs. Emma Carroll, who founded the business more than a half century ago.

Landmark preservation restrictions imposed on the store following Mrs. Carroll's death made it impractical for the Hawks to continue in business there.

The logic behind the restrictions is difficult to understand. Admittedly, the building has considerable charm, but the only historic elements about it are the walls at either end. The rest of it was demolished and rebuilt back in the 1950s.

Glencoe Gardens was an antique shop like no other. It was not simply a business; it was a community center. Friends, neighbors and, indeed, absolute strangers, would regularly drop by for refreshments, a gossip and advice about art, antiques, sprots, politics and even the weather.

It was a fascinating treasure trove of the most extraordinary items. Oriental rugs, antique silverware, jewelry, fine furniture, tables of all sorts, glass and porcelain rubbed shoulders with chiming clocks, paintings, oil lamps, bulldog lanterns, samurai swords, mysterious pieces of Victorian – and earlier – kitchen equipment, not to mention farm tools, saddlery and books; thousand of books from 20th Century novels to arcane 17th century theology.

If you were looking for something extraordinary – such as a copper bath tub from a 19th century settler's log cabin (I kid you not) -- chances are you would find it at Glencoe Gardens.

One of things that made Glencoe Gardens unique was that Colby and Wiley accepted goods on consignment, and, once accepted, those items would remain the owners until they sold or taken back home. There was never a time limit on consignment sales.

As a consequence, some of the more obscure consignments had languished in the store for more years than most people would care to remember.

A week or so ago, Colby and Wiley held a three-day 50 percent off sale. Stuff flew out of the door, but, such was the quantity of stock, there is still a ton of it left.

If you are in the market for something remarkable – fine furniture, a drop leaf table, porcelain, china, earthenware, silverware, a vast Victorian ice water pitcher, books of all sorts, or simply something you don't know what – don't miss the three-day auction.

FROM THE TREASURER

IT HAS become something of a tradition at this time of the year for me to beg you to have "pity on the poor treasurer" and send in your offering before you go on vacation rather than when you come back.

Church income often declines quite steeply in the summer months when folks are off enjoying themselves in the mountains or on the shore. The trouble is that the bills don't take a vacation. They just keep rolling in.

Misery likes company, they say. But it is not really much comfort to know that all of the nation's churches suffer from the same problem – especially during this current deep recession.

As I said at the annual parish meeting, the recession has hit young churches like St. Stephen's hard. The problem, of course, is that we have no endowment and little in the way of reserves – something the vestry is working hard to rectify.

But converting plans to action takes time. And while we are confident the parish's long-term financial stability will be assured, the short term financial management occasions some finger nail biting.

The problem is cash flow. As I have told you, financially speaking, we are just scraping by. Giving is currently down by 7 percent on 2009, itself a hard financial year. But we have cut overheads to the bone and are keeping our financial heads above water.

If you are able maintain your giving during the summer months, thing should not be too difficult. But the fact of the matter is that our short-term money troubles could be largely solved for not much more than the price of a pack of cigarettes a week from each of you.
