FROM THE RECTOR

Taking the thanks out of Thanksgiving Day

THANKSGIVING is the one day of the year when all families, no matter how fractured, fractious and dysfunctional, make an extra special effort to get along. It is a time when the most selfish of spouses and hapless of homemakers try to make up for the other 364 days of abject failure -- a time of togetherness, if not in front of an altar then in front of a TV screen.

While, in many respects, this is entirely praiseworthy, there is also something decidedly odd about it. God, after all, should be the central focus of Thanksgiving Day. Yet he comes far behind turkey, pumpkin pie and football. Thanksgiving, in short, has become more a celebration of our secular interests.

Instead of being a time for giving thanks for all the blessings God has showered on our nation, it is for many a day of self-congratulation for having scraped through yet another year. And this is a trifle weird. It is like staging a lavish testimonial dinner and then deliberately excluding the person whose accomplishments are being honored. And it isn't simply bad manners. It is very, very silly – silly because God's absence makes the celebration entirely pointless.

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Yet even in the countryside, God is rapidly vanishing from Thanksgiving. We live in an age of factory farming. Technology is king. We plant two or three crops and grow 'em by hundreds of acres. Farm kids are raised on the same prepackaged, homogenized, vitamin enriched diets as their town dwelling counterparts, and they, too, probably wouldn't even recognize their foodstuffs in their natural state.

But the truth to tell, we are not a whit less dependent on God's grace for what the Prayer Book calls "the returns of the fruits of the earth" than we were 400 years ago. The fact that most of us can't tell the difference between fields of wheat, barley, rye and hay doesn't make the grain harvest any less important.

Modern pesticides and fertilizers have vastly increased farmers' yields, and advances in food preservation and refrigeration technologies in recent years have enormously improved our storage and distribution capabilities. But this does not diminish the importance of God's role in the process.

There are so many more mouths to feed than there were half a century ago, famine would have been endemic had God not endowed us with powers of invention. Indeed, back in the late 1960s – long before the now forgotten nuclear winter scare, long before Vice President Al Gore discovered the fortune to be made from global warming – a professional doomsayer named Paul Ehrlich wrote a book entitled "The Population Bomb." In it, Ehrlich predicted widespread and catastrophic famines would take place, starting in the mid-1970s.

Ehrlich, however, reckoned without our fast developing agricultural technologies – including genetic engineering. Our Godgiven resourcefulness has not only granted us an abundant food supply, it has enabled us to ship food to the parts of the world where hunger was once endemic. That is a very real reason for every one in the world to fall on their knees and thank God.

But our God-given cleverness has proved a bane as well as a blessing. It often mutates into an infatuation with the human intellect that prevents many of us from developing any meaningful relationship with our creator and sustainer.

It seduces us into attributing to our own innate cleverness the credit for our ability to grow larger, but far less flavorful, vegetables – and vaster, but vastly less tasty, turkeys – than our forebears. It makes us oblivious to the fact that cultivation and creation are horses of entirely different colors.

We should consider the Thanksgiving Gospel in this light. In it, Jesus explains that if we say we believe in God, we ought to act like it. If we believe, for example, that he really is the almighty, all-seeing, all-loving creator of all things then we ought to trust him to care for us and act in our best interests.

He is urging us to cultivate a childlike faith. The word "childlike" is not be confused with the word "childish." There's nothing childish about a childlike faith. Nothing could be more mature. After all, Jesus says: "Verily I say unto you, Whosoever shall not receive the kingdom of God as a little child, he shall not enter therein."

Children, for example, have no difficulty with the concept of miracles. Children instinctively grasp that, for God, doing a miracle is simply a piece of cake. Adults, by contrast, distract themselves with pointless questions that have no bearing on the real issue. Rather than ponder <u>WHY</u> God performs a particular miracle, we try to figure out the unimportant technicalities concerning <u>HOW</u> he performs it.

Kids go directly to the heart of the matter – to the "Why?" not to the "How?" And they have no difficulty accepting that the unsophisticated but entirely correct answer is: "Because God loves us." Knowing the right answer is very important. Until we can accept God's love, we will find it impossible to show him the gratitude we owe him. Indeed, it is the acceptance of his love that puts the "thanks" in Thanksgiving. **GPH**
