FROM THE RECTOR

Let Founding Fathers speak for themselves

Much that is fanciful – and, sadly, plain false – has been written about our Founding Fathers and their religious beliefs. Take, for example, today's fashionable claims that they were predominantly ardent secularists and that, far from founding our constitution upon Christian principles, they created it on largely secular ones.

In view of all this, during the week in which we celebrate our nation's independence, we might do them the courtesy of letting them speak for themselves. And who better to start than **John Adams**.

On the day the Continental Congress approved the Declaration of Independence, Adams wrote to his wife Abigail: "[July 4th] ought to be commemorated as the day of deliverance by solemn acts of devotion to God Almighty."

"The general principles upon which the Fathers achieved independence were the general principals of Christianity... I will avow that I believed, and now believe, that those general principles of Christianity are as eternal and immutable as the existence and attributes of God."

Again, in a letter written in 1798 to **Thomas Jefferson** 1798, he said: "We have no government armed with power capable of contending with human passions unbridled by morality and religion. Avarice, ambition, revenge, or gallantry, would break the strongest cords of our Constitution as a whale goes through a net. Our Constitution was made only for a moral and religious people. It is wholly inadequate to the government of any other."

John Quincy Adams agreed. In a Fourth of July speech in 1837, he declared: "Is it not that, in the chain of human events, the birthday of the nation is indissolubly linked with the birthday of the Savior? That it forms a leading event in the progress of the Gospel dispensation? Is it not that the Declaration of Independence first

organized the social compact on the foundation of the Redeemer's mission upon earth? That it laid the cornerstone of human government upon the first precepts of Christianity?"

Charles Carroll wrote to **James McHenry**, November 4th, 1800: "Without morals a republic cannot subsist any length of time; they therefore who are decrying the Christian religion, whose morality is so sublime and pure...are undermining the solid foundation of morals, the best security for the duration of free governments."

Alexander Hamilton founded the Christian Constitutional Society, explaining: "Its object is first: The support of the Christian religion. Second: The support of the United States."

Patrick Henry, in a speech to the Virginia House of Burgesses, declared: "It cannot be emphasized too clearly and too often that this nation was founded, not by religionists, but by Christians; not on religion, but on the gospel of Jesus Christ."

John Jay, on October 12th, 1816, observed: "Providence has given to our people the choice of their rulers, and it is the duty, as well as the privilege and interest of our Christian nation to select and prefer Christians for their rulers."

James Madison declared to the General Assembly of the State of Virginia in 1778: "We've staked our future on our ability to follow the Ten Commandments with all of our heart. We have staked the whole future of American civilization, not upon the power of government, far from it. We've staked the future of all our political institutions upon our capacity ... to sustain ourselves according to the Ten Commandments of God."

Benjamin Franklin, not noted these days for Christian piety, insisted in his 1749 plan of education for public schools in Pennsylvania, that they teach "the excellency of the Christian religion above all others, ancient or modern."

This was not an aberration. On June 28th, 1787, at the Constitutional Convention, Franklin declared: "God

governs in the affairs of man ...We have been assured in the Sacred Writings that except the Lord build the house, they labor in vain that build it. I firmly believe this. I also believe that, without His concurring aid, we shall succeed in this political building no better than the builders of Babel”

Thomas Jefferson, another modern secularist hero, said: "I am a real Christian, that is to say, a disciple of the doctrines of Jesus...God who gave us life gave us liberty. And can the liberties of a nation be thought secure when we have removed their only firm basis, a conviction in the minds of the people that these liberties are a gift from God? That they are not to be violated but with His wrath? Indeed I tremble for my country when I reflect that God is just, and that His justice cannot sleep forever.”

George Washington, told Delaware Indian chiefs, May 12th, 1779, “It is impossible to rightly govern the world without God and Bible.. What students would learn in American schools above all is the religion of Jesus Christ.”

At Valley Forge in 1778, he declared: "To the distinguished character of patriot, it should be our highest glory to add the more distinguished character of Christian" And at his inauguration as President, Washington

summoned a Bible on which to take the oath, added the words “So help me God!” to the end of the oath, then leaned over and kissed the Bible.

The last word fittingly should go to Noah Webster, who wrote in the preface to his American Dictionary of the English Language: “In my view, the Christian religion is the most important and one of the first things in which all children, under a free government, ought to be instructed ... No truth is more evident to my mind than that the Christian religion must be the basis of any government intended to secure the rights and privileges of a free people.” GPHE
